Looking ahead, looking positive

The Pandemic has certainly affected education sector in a big way like it has to other sectors. But what's the way forward? MANASA KAMBANNA finds out

Students from across India look forward to seek admission into not only programmes in engineering, business and medicine, but also various other fields from pure sciences, social sciences to humanities in the city. rent situation. "The first two weeks after the lockdown were the most confusing times. None of us were sure of taking any decision. But when it was clear that the situation was not going to get better any time soon, we decided to go with online teaching," recalls S. Sacchidanand, Vice-chancellor, Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences (RGUHS). If most colleges took to online mode for conducting the last semester exams, others like RGUHS continued with the offline mode. "We have successfully conducted exams as usual with at most precautions since August and they have been almost completed for all the years," he informs. "Some

When it comes to attending online classes, "there were difficulties faced by students who could not afford high-speed internet connection. However, for 90 percent of our student community adapting to on-line classes has been smooth," remarks K.N. Subramanya, Principal, R.V. College of Engineering.

It took about two-three months for the institutions

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

"However, other streams such as civil, mechanical engineering are not able to have the hands-on experience in their labs," observes K.N. Subramanya. While the medical colleges are finishing their theory part of the syllabus, students are waiting to hit their labs to understand the practical. "Many of our students have already expressed their longing for being in the college campus and in the vicinity of their teachers," he chuckles.

K.N. Subramanya is grateful for some of these platforms for providing their service free of cost for educational institutions at least during the initial days of the pandomic.

Due to the ongoing pandemic, does the number of admissions in the higher education sector in Karnataka go down this academic year? "Certainly there will be a drop in number of students coming from other states this time. They might end up joining colleges claser home. However, this vacuum might he filled by students who were unable to go abroad for their higher studies and also those from tier-three cities from within State," observes K.N. Subramanya.

"Once the ComedK process is fully over, we would get a clarity on admission numbers and composition." he adds.
